

The Morgan Working Cowhorse

The Working Cow Horse event is exactly what the name implies, and shows the much-needed versatility of a working western horse. There are three components: reining, cutting, and fence work. A working cow horse has to perform a reining pattern, cut cows, and then show he can control a cow both in the open and along a fence line. The horse has to move the cow along the fence and then turn it the opposite direction at speed. Then the horse has to take the cow to the center of the arena and circle around the cow both directions, showing control.



Rodeo and Caming

Rodeo and Gaming, as competitive sports, evolved from the hardworking lifestyle of the western cowboy. After driving herds of cattle to market, competitions between those working for rival ranches often developed. Some events sprang from everyday work, while others probably came from accepting a dare to do the almost impossible. The traditional rodeo events reflect this history. These are all timed events and include calf roping, team roping, barrel racing, goat tying, pole bending, break away roping, and many more. The athleticism of our Morgan horses makes them excellent partners in these events!





Reining is the newest explosion in the Working Western world! Reining is the only Western discipline to be recognized by the *Federation Equestre International* (FEI) and the first one slated for the Olympics. The governing body for the division, the *National Reining Horse Association*, has designed a judging system that gives all breeds an equal chance at being judged on an equal basis by unbiased judges. If your Morgan can do the job, he will be scored accordingly. It is no surprise that the Morgan can excel in the reining pen. Their great athletic ability, sound mind, conformation, and good work ethic make them an excellent choice for your next reining horse!

The Morgan Team Penner

A timed event, the object of team penning is for a team of three riders to sort three assigned, like-numbered cattle from a herd of 30 and herd the three scored cattle into a pen at one end of the arena — all in less than 90 seconds. Morgan tractability, speed, agility, and love of the game makes them excellent penners!

The Morgan Role in the Historic West

The Morgan played an integral role in the development of the West in the 1800s and early 1900s, carrying settlers to their new homes, working the cattle on their cattle ranches, packing their owners into the mountains to hunt, and playing rodeo games on their days off. Things have changed through the years, but these great horses are still doing all of the above (except carrying settlers to their new homes)! The Morgan Cutter

The Morgan horse makes an exceptional cutting horse. Ranchers separated cattle for a variety of reasons and the Morgan proved to be a good partner. Separating stock for shipping, giving vaccinations, moving from pasture to pasture, all duties the Morgan loves. Cutting competitions are derived from this necessary work on the ranch and have become more of an art form. In cutting competition, the judge focuses on many different things; how the horse enters the herd, how difficult the cow is to handle, how well the horse makes the moves to keep the cow in front of the herd. Morgans have loads of cow savvy and love the challenge of working the cows!
